Blixen Lecturer Dr. David Chang



Each spring since 2012 the department has brought a leading scholar in American Studies to campus . These have included Carlo Rotella (Boston College), Phil Deloria (University of Michigan), Melani McAlister (George Washington University), Brent Hayes Edwards (Columbia University), and—this year—David Chang (University of Minnesota).

Chang's first book, *The Color of the Land: Race, Nation, and the Politics of Land Ownership in Oklahoma*, 1832–1929 (University of North Carolina Press, 2010), was the winner of the 2010 Theodore Saloutos Prize for best book in agricultural history from the Agricultural History Society and received an honorable mention for the 2011 Lora Romero First Book Prize from the American Studies Association. His second book, *The World and All the Things upon It: Native Hawaiian Geographies of Exploration* was published in 2016 by the University of Minnesota Press.

Chang met with graduate students for a brown-bag lunch discussion on Wednesday, March 17th from 12-1pm. He then delivered a lecture centered on *The World and All the Things upon It* at 4pm. The lecture was followed by a reception where attendees had the opportunity to talk with Chang about his work.

Letter from the Chair

Dear Friends,


Spotlight on Dr. Emily Lutenski



An Assistant Professor at SLU since 2012, Dr. Lutenski received her PhD in English and Women's Studies at the University of Michigan and previously taught in Ethnic Studies at Bowling Green University. At SLU, she teaches courses on literature and culture focusing on a range of topics from the Harlem Renaissance to Borderlands to Race, Gender, and Social Justice. This last course is her newest undergraduate offering and will incorporate both Micah students and a Learning Community with an expected enrollment of 50 students.

Emily's passion for teaching and dedication to her students was formally recognized in her appointment as our Undergraduate Coordinator last fall. In that capacity she works on recruitment, curriculum development, advising, and programming for our undergraduate majors and minors. One of our departmental goals is to continue to grow our undergraduate major and Emily is working hard to make that happen. Visiting speaker Daphne Brooks described her as a "force of nature," and we are privileged to have her energy focused on our students and our department.

Dr. Lutenski recently published her first book *West of Harlem: African American and the Borderlands* (University Press of Kansas, 2015). She also serves on numerous college and university committees on campus and is a leader in regional and national professional organizations.





Memorial Event

Associate Professor Ben Looker has received three major awards for his second book, *A Nation of Neighborhoods: Imagining Cities, Communities, and Democracy in Postwar America* (University of Chicago Press, 2015). The Organization of American Historians acknowledged it with the Lawrence W. Levine award for the best book in American cultural history. The 2016 Missouri Conference gave him their History Book Award in March. And, just a few weeks ago, Dr. Looker won the 2016 Kenneth Jackson Award for the best book in urban history given by the Urban History Association.
