

The purpose of the meetings are threefold:

1. Convene a network of OTs and key stakeholders in justice reform.
2. Explore the role of OT in justice-based practice, teaching, and research; and identify what information is critical for sharing with a wider audience.
3. Refine a working manuscript for submission to a scholarly journal to disseminate OT's role in justice-based practice.

We also convened international partners in JBOT at the World Federation of OT congress in Cape Town, South Africa in May, 2018!



JBOT AROUND THE U.S.

Pacific University had two Level II students over the summer of 2018. They provided care and also worked on program development. One student worked on educating the staff and treatment team members about trauma informed care, and the other student created a problem solving group for the residents of the correctional facility. That problem solving group was then implemented by a capstone doctoral student who also did other great things during her capstone internship. This student also introduced and educated the corrections staff and treatment team on the idea of addiction as occupation. It was really great! [Halley Read, MOT, OTR/L].

Saint Louis University TJI/OTTIS [Transformative Justice Initiative's Occupational Therapy Transition & Integration Services] has completed their 2nd year with the City of St. Louis jail providing pre- and post-release services. To date, we've hosted 3 OTA FWII, 3 OT FWII, 1 OTD capstone, and many student volunteers. We completed a study with the Transition Center of St. Louis to explore workplace health needs and to inform new reentry programming processes. The SLU Health Criminology Research Consortium held their 2nd annual symposium and first practitioner day bringing together interprofessional research and practice. [Lisa Jaegers, PhD, OTR/L].

Duquesne University: We continue to place students in Community Engaged Learning sites with justice involved individuals in the local jail and programs primarily through a community partner called Renewal: <https://renewalinc.com>.
